Show Me Your Faith By Your Works



Hello! Thank you for the vacation time I enjoyed during the month of July. I traveled with my son to Oregon, hosted my sister and her husband from Hong Kong, and relaxed in the garden with several fine books.

That said, I'm so glad to be back in the office and looking ahead to the next few months we'll enjoy together here at UUCSR before my sabbatical begins in January. The

theme of our September worship services is *WORK* and it is an apt one for this time of year, when we busily gear up for the start of another "church year" (as we say in the vernacular). Of course, as you know, the congregation and the year actually never pause in their work, but this is very much a special and vibrant time of year for us.

Just as school starts up again for families out in the wide world, so does our Children's Religious Education program begin anew. Later in these pages you will read our Director Deborah Mason's report (you will, won't you?), but let me lift up one wonderful fact in particular. There are 22 known toddlers and infants in our preschool on Sundays, and that number is growing all the time. It is so good to see our ministry to parents and families bearing such joyful fruit!

Each autumn our *Together in Exploration (T.I.E.)* program kicks off again, too. I want everyone to consider joining one of these delightful discussion groups that bring 8 – 10 people together for spiritual, philosophical and personal reflection. This is a great way to meet people, particularly for new members and friends. If it's been awhile since you've participated, consider a return engagement. The T.I.E. Steering Committee is also accepting applications for facilitators. We will train you on September 21st and support you with monthly T.I.E. groups that meet with me and/or our Intern Minister Bryan Plude.

Adult Religious Education here at UUCSR has received a major shot in the arm over the last few months, with several new offerings planned including a real treat from Rev. Shirley Ranck on the Seven Principles. My Scripture Study classes will again be on Tuesdays at 8:00am and 5:00pm, starting on October 1st. We will be reading selections from the *Quran*.

Meanwhile, the Hot Topics on our ministry to the homeless provoked great interest and enthusiasm and it seems clear that we will develop more ways to be of direct service to our brothers and sisters on the streets. Already our meeting has prompted the Sonoma County Task Force on the Homeless to revisit the idea of a rotating emergency shelter! Concerned people really can make a difference – as all of you involved in community organizing already know.

Finally – due only to space – our Pagan community has begun to blossom as well, with my warm blessing and support. Keep your eyes peeled for upcoming rituals and circles to mark the natural seasons and cycles of the year. I'm so delighted to see different forms of spiritual practice and perspective thriving under our roof, and it is also my hope that, as time unfolds, UU Christianity might also blossom within our walls, reclaiming its

right place in the heart of our tradition, along with UU Buddhism, UU Humanism, UU Paganism and the other major sub-streams of Unitarian Universalism that we jointly celebrate here. But that's a topic for another day!

For now, there's plenty do, and I hope you will find a way to get involved in ways big or small, for your own sake. I believe that the work of building a community of hope, service and faith is essential to every person's full development as a human being. So jump in - the water is fine!

And this ain't just any water. It's the water of life that we get to drink and share together here in our work.

Does that overstate the case? I don't think so.

We build a religious community together as a testimony to the way of life we espouse. We make it so in the real world. We do the work of governance and finances and building maintenance so that we have a place to gather to worship, to teach our children, and to pursue our mission of celebrating life, empowering people, caring for one another, and helping to build a better world. We share in the life of a religious community to help build a container that keeps love in, and hate out; one that lets people heal and flower and fulfill themselves. We want to grow in our ability to love one another and ourselves, which we do by pursuing a good and noble way of life together.

The fundamental purpose of this congregation, as stated in our by-laws, is to affirm and promote the Principles of the Unitarian Universalist Association. That means, to a greater or lesser degree, everything we do here has to have something to do with these moral aims:

- * The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- * Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- * Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
 - * A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- * The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- * The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- * Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

The good news is that we <u>are</u> manifesting these values in our congregation, with joy and laughter and friendship to boot. That's how I know the center of UUCSR is good and faithful and true.

At the end of Psalm 90 there is a lovely line where the Psalmist prays, "May the beauty and favor of God rest on us; establish the work of our hands for us – yes, establish the work of our hands."

May it be so for us as well! Blessings on all our work, in our own lives and together here at UUCSR.

Religious Education for Children and Youth

I am so happy to announce the formation of the Religious Education Committee. The committee is structured around six areas of RE programming. Our six committee members are: Susan Dickey, Fellowship/Activities Coordinator. She will be the lead coordinator for social events for parents and children during the congregational year. Emily Heinzelmann, Registration Coordinator. Emily will help coordinate a registration day at the beginning of the congregational year and help develop a process for registration throughout the year for families who come on board after the fall. Susan Miller, Preschool Liaison will keep abreast of the needs of the ever growing preschool program, and report to the committee and DRE as they arise.

Denielle Medynski, Coordinator of Social Ac-

tion/Community Service, will assist in planning social action or community service activities for RE classes. **Erica Mora**, Arts and Crafts Coordinator. Erica will help with planning arts/crafts activities for Sunday morning RE classes. **Jennifer Freese**, Teacher Recruitment Coordinator, will help me with recruiting volunteers to teach on Sunday mornings. I am so grateful to have this team of caring UU parents to help with the work of making our RE program the best it can be!

We begin age-grouped RE classes on September 15. This year the focus will be on learning and integrating the Seven Unitarian Universalist Principles. Grades K-2 will learn from a UUA Tapestry of Faith program, *Love Surrounds Us*. It is a really fun and engaging program for our youngest elementary kids. The Principles are introduced with activities and story. The program teaches children to

articulate their faith in the world. They will come knowing they are Unitarian Universalists, and leave knowing why, as the Principles help answer the question "Why do I belong?" Kids 3rd to 8th grade will have a program called:

<u>We Believe:</u> Learning and Living Our UU Principles. This is a program that engages children of a wide age-range in exploring and experiencing our UU Principles through stories, learning about our UU forebears, discussions, activities, and worship experiences. Each Sunday the kids will get the opportunity to put the ideas of the session to work in an active and intentional way – to live our principles.

Our preschool is bursting at the seams. What a gift it is to have so many little ones with us!! This month we will open a second preschool room. Our babies and toddlers up to age 3 will be in the preschool room (room 3) as usual. Children age 3 and 4 will be in room 2. We will be equipping the new room with toys and fun decorations throughout the month. The two classrooms will be staffed with one of our paid preschool teachers and one volunteer from the congregation.

The youth group will kick off the new congregational year with a sleep over on Friday, Sept. 6.

It is going to be a new RE year filled with promise and joy. Thanks in advance for all who will serve to make it so.

Adult Ed: Our Seven Principles in Story and Verse

Our Seven Principles in Story and Verse - The first class in our Adult Religious Edcation Program begins Saturday, September 14, from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and will meet each Saturday through October 26th.

To quote Kenneth Collier (retired UU minister who served in Palo Alto and Santa Barbara and is the author of Our Seven Principles in Story and Verse):

"'What do Unitarian Universalists believe?' What is there to say? We have no creed, no confession of faith, no body of dogma and we disagree a lot about theological matters.

There are few I can appeal to that most Unitarian Universalists will agree with--at least few that are worth bothering with. There is one exception, though, and that is the

statement of Principles and Purposes in the Bylaws of the Unitarian Universalist Association. This is something that is both agreed upon among us generally and says something worth listening to and contemplating."

Shirley Ranck, a retired UU minister and current member of our congregation, will guide us in this exploration of Our Seven Principles. She is the author of the popular feminist thealogy curriculum, *Cakes for the Queen of Heaven*, which many people enjoyed this past year. Her new book is *The Grandmother Galaxy*.

Minimum class size: 8 persons - but we welcome more. (There will be a fee of \$30 which includes the cost of the book...or, pay what you can.)

Music Notes

Do You Like to Sing? 2013 – 2014 Choir Season Begins this Month!

Our choir season begins with a rehearsal on Thursday, September 5th (see details below). We will then sing for the two Ingathering Services on the following Sunday, September 8th.

Singing in a choir is a great place to start for those who want to express themselves through song but have little experience or confidence in doing so. When you sing in a choir, you're not up there alone. You have the supporting voices and spirit of all those in the group, and you have an opportunity to enhance the worship experience both for yourself and for the congregation.

Here are a few excerpts from an article on the UUA Website about the benefits of singing in a choir:

"What would our Sunday mornings be like without our choirs? Fortunately most of us will never have to find out. All across the country there are friends and members of our congregations who are committed to giving us music."

"A choir is a place of deep spiritual practice... It can be transformative and life-changing for choir members."

"In a world in which we live in our heads maybe too much, music is our heart connection."

Is the UUCSR Choir Right for You?

Our choir is made up of people from various musical backgrounds - some with years of experience and

others who have never been in a choir before. The music we work on is diverse, including spirituals, musical theater, world music, and well known choral pieces.

Being in the choir does involve some time commitments. We rehearse Thursday nights from 7--8:30 pm. We begin rehearsals with some physical warmups - light stretching and loosening up. Then we move on to vocal warmups before we work on songs.

On days that the choir sings in a service, we arrive a half hour before the service to warm up and rehearse. Most Sundays we sing for only one service (either 9:15 or 11:00), but occasionally we will sing for both. Also, because we must learn most music fairly quickly, it helps to practice on your own outside of the rehearsal. A website with practice files and song samples is available to assist you.

Joining the choir is also a great way to meet new people. In addition to making music together, we also socialize through occasional parties and special events. But is our choir right for you? The best way to find out is to come to a rehearsal. Being able to read music is an advantage, but not a requirement. However, the ability to match pitch or "carry a tune" is important. If you are uncertain about your singing ability, or if you have any questions, please contact our Music Director, Nancy Hayashibara at musicdirector@uusantarosa.org.

Does it strike you as odd that all over the country nearly identical "Stand Your Ground" Laws are working their way through state legislatures? Is it a coincidence when several states see an urgent need for similar laws to eliminate environmental protection regulations? Why all the push back on laws simply requiring the labeling of GMO foods? And what about the many states that have passed laws making it harder to vote although there is no proof of significant voter fraud? ALEC (the American Legislative Exchange) has been influencing, and often writing, such state laws for decades! It is an organization (composed of corporations such as Monsanto and advocacy groups such as the NRA) that has decided the best way to pass laws that

benefit its members is to wine and dine and "educate" state rather than national legislators. ALEC has flown under the public's radar for decades, and only recently has come under public scrutiny due to the Trayvon Martin case involving the Florida "Stand Your Ground" Law.

From 12:30 to 2:00 p.m. on **Sunday, September 8th,** Helen Grieco, an organizer for Common Cause of Northern California, will speak, share a video and answer our questions about ALEC and its tactics. She will also suggest ways we can combat the undue influence ALEC has over public policy.

The North Bay Organizing Project

The North Bay Organizing Project is a part of Gamaliel—hey, isn't that where Barack Obama got his organizing chops? You are right!

We are now members of what is affectionately known as NBOP. We are one of 19 organizations (an ever growing number) who organize for social justice issues. The current areas of concern are immigration, transportation justice, and education.

What does our membership mean? Well, we are part of a very cool group of people and we can individually choose to participate in a number of ways.

Actions: These are events where we hope to "bring the bodies." A recent action was at the Santa Rosa City Schools Board meeting at City Hall on August 14th. About 25 people showed up to celebrate the board's consent to a program to reduce expulsions district-wide. We dressed in black and white, we had inspiring speakers, and a mariachi band to add to the celebratory spirit! We are working toward the approval of a pilot program in a middle and high school to address suspensions and expulsions. This is an exciting first step!

Task Forces: Currently there are 3 task forces: Immigration, Transportation Justice, and Education. Anyone can join a task force if they are interested. Meetings are usually monthly. The task forces set up meetings with public officials, plan actions, present research, provide training and evaluate progress. **House meetings**: We meet in small groups to discuss issues of concern to congregation members. This is a way to deepen relationships and to discover issues or

needs within the congregation. House meetings can also be expanded to include other member organizations-- which in the past, was very inspiring.

Fundraising events: NBOP just had an amazing fundraising event in Sebastopol. Noche Sabrosa had delicious food, dance lessons, terrific music, a robust dance contest, and just a bunch of lovely people. It was so much fun!

One-on-one meetings: A chance to meet one-on-one to expand personal relationships and discuss social justice issues.

UUCAN: You can join UUCAN, also known as an NBOP "core team." Each member organization has a core team. UUCAN organizes house meetings, helps inform the congregation about actions and events, communicates issues and concerns to NBOP, and provides two representatives to the Leadership Council of NBOP.

The Leadership Council: Two members of UUCAN attend the monthly Leadership Council meetings. The council is responsible for strategic planning and is accountable to their member organizations for the work of NBOP.

So, please, join in this wonderful work! You can choose your level of involvement. You could join UUCAN and not be on a task force. Some people may only be interested in house meetings or actions. Maybe you only want to come to the fun fundraising events. Please, just choose to be involved. It's a blessing. Treasurer's Report: (Linda Balabanian) We balanced our budget from surplus of \$16,000 from last year. This year we have added to that up to \$30,000. However, until we get to the Final Budget we won't know what we really have. Lois B. asked if we might put some back into the Endowment Fund. We could also revisit some of the smaller projects around the property such as the stained carpeting. John asked if the Building and Maintenance Committee has spent their budget; Laura Jean observed that they may feel they should get the work done by volunteers rather than hire people.

Financial Stewardship Request: Approval requested of continuing Financial Stewardship members: Kirsten Olney, Mary Louise Jaffray, Linda Balabanian, as well as new members: Jennifer Murray, Amy Young, Laura Jean Hageman, Robin Rogers. Lois Bell made the motion to approve, (2nd) Jeanie motion passed, with thanks to Linda for putting together this great team!

A motion was put forth (Mary Louise) to give Financial Stewardship authorization to spend up to 3% of the Operating Fund (around \$15,000) for "unbudgeted repairs and replacements." Fine Stew would work with Building and Maintenance re: projects, and with input from David Templeton re: concerns related to rentals. (2nd) Susan, motion passed.

Proposed Islamic Society Lease: (Laura Jean) David Templeton has presented a lease renewal proposal to the Glaser Center Committee and they approved it. We are trying to formalize the process and give David a tool to use in negotiations. This lease could go into effect Aug 1 - we need to give 30 days notice. It asks for an 8% increase but we will take over the HVAC maintenance. Also, they are requesting use of the Board Room for occasional use (up to 65 hours a year) which would be included. John moved that the Board give David approval for this, (2nd) Joe - motion passed.

Review Intern Timeline: (Laura Jean) Bryan's stay with us ends June 2014, so Sept. 2014 would be the time for a new intern. We need to form an Internship Search Committee who would process the applications and make recommendations. Rev Chris would then interview the potential candidate. We need to come up with a suggested list of names for this committee soon.

We also need to create a site profile and internship web page, and apply for an Intern Stipend Grant renewal.

Goal Groups' Contributions to Board's Annual Report due Sept 1: (Laura Jean).

Board Retreat Planning: (Jeanie) Each person on the Board is asked to pay \$155 towards food and lodging (over and above the \$1,000 that's in the Budget.) Jeanie will receive

the checks - made out to UUCSR - and then get them to Janis. Jeanie distributed an outline of the Board Retreat Plan which lists who will be part of what aspects of the retreat - if anyone wants to participate in any other ways they can contact the person listed for that item.

Proposal to do a Social for new Board members, Treasurer and Corp Secty: (Jeanie) Is this something the group would like to do? Discussion followed with the final decision not to do it in part because of crowded schedule due to Aug Board Meeting plus Aug Retreat.

Infrastructure Goal Group Report: (John) Banner Inc. will do the HVAC job (\$9,885) starting Mon eve - the crane will be here very early Tuesday and then all day. We also have bids for the HVAC maintenance check: IES \$2,392 yr/\$140 hr as compared to Banner \$1,800 yr/\$95 hr; we'll probably switch to Banner if the project goes well. We're also looking into an HVAC issue in the RE area - will ask Banner to assess. Joy Lonnes brought up taking another look at creating a "green" sanctuary re: the 7th principle - John is looking into it. Reminder that all graffiti needs to be dealt with promptly.

Community Outreach Team: (Lois Nagle) The committee has met and is looking at: "How does our congregation serve each person and how can we get people more involved?" They recognize that different people will respond to different approaches. Gretchen Vap and Phyllis Clement are leading this.

Adult RE Committee: (Lois Bell) The group has been meeting every two weeks. First offering will be a class of seven sessions on the Principles which will cost \$30, including a book; Shirley Ranck will teach it. Two other offerings for winter and spring are being looked at. The Congregational Survey is the base of all this. They are looking for more members.

Final Reflections and Appreciations: Appreciations to Laura Jean, Lois Nagle, and Mary Louise for their great work - you will be missed. Thanks to Jeanie for taking on the new Board presidency. Mary Louise said she has enjoyed being a part of this and appreciates Laura Jean for all that has been accomplished. Laura Jean said she has felt well supported and that it has been a joy - and that she is looking forward to not having as much responsibility but that it has been good for her! (The Board presented Laura Jean with a lovely gift of a Singing Bowl and a card signed by all.)


